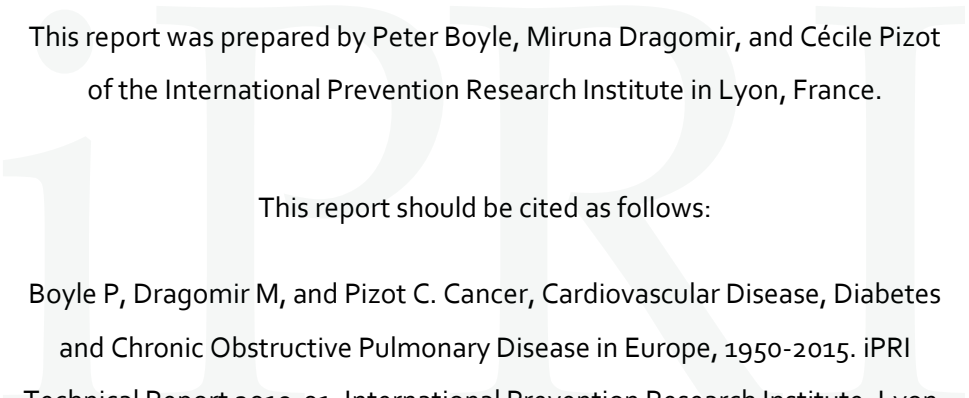
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Serbia

In Serbia, data on deaths are available from 1998 to 2015 in the WHO mortality database.

Of the four major causes of death considered, Cardiovascular Disease (CVD) is the most important, followed by all malignant neoplasms and Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD). Mortality rates from cancer, cardiovascular disease and COPD are higher in men than in women. An increase in mortality from all forms of cancer has been observed since the late 1990s, followed by a decline starting in the late 2000s. For cardiovascular diseases, a decline in mortality is observed from the late 1990s. The same is observed for COPD but the decrease in rates is more moderate. Mortality from diabetes remains difficult to interpret.

Lung and breast cancers are the commonest causes of cancer death. For colorectal cancer, lung cancer and haematological malignancies, there is an increase in mortality rates over the period 1998-2015. For breast cancer, mortality seems stable. On the other hand, a decline in mortality from stomach cancer is observed in both genders over the period 1998-2015.



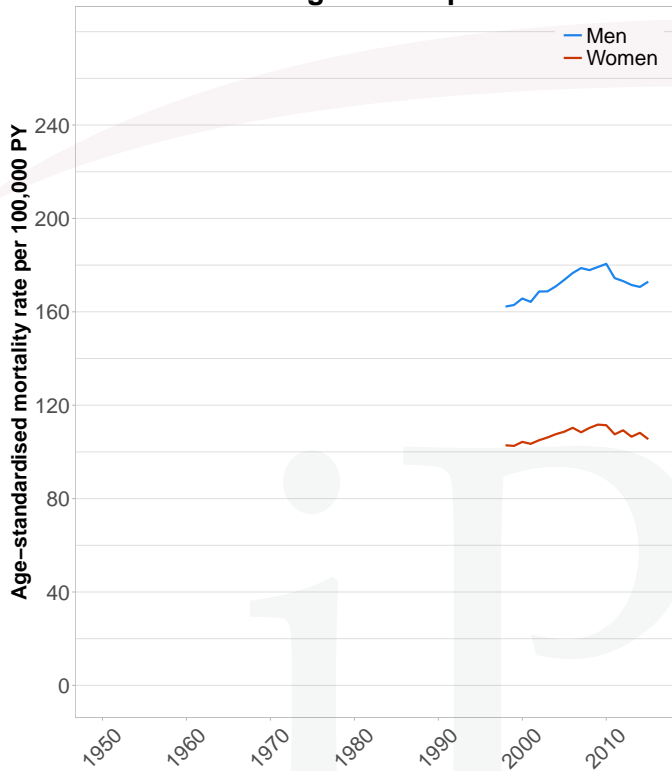

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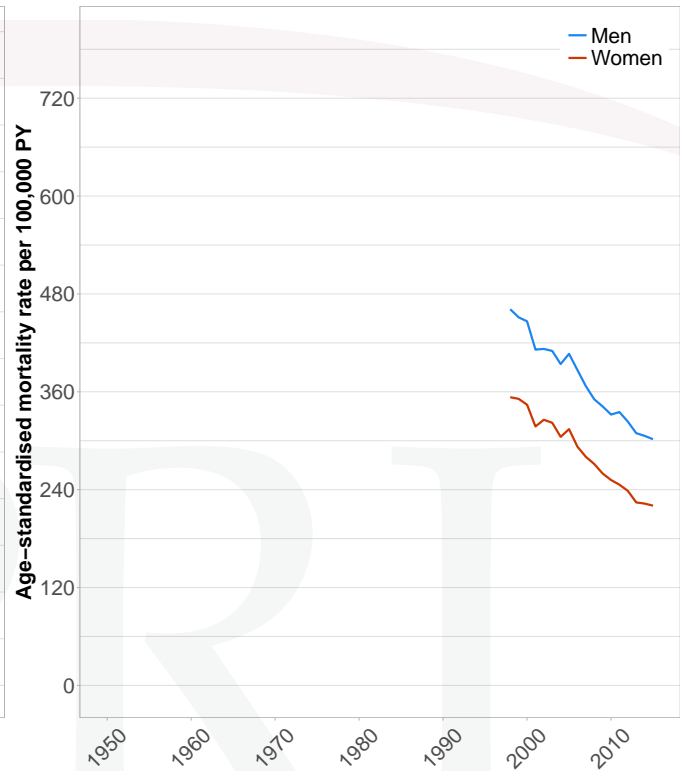

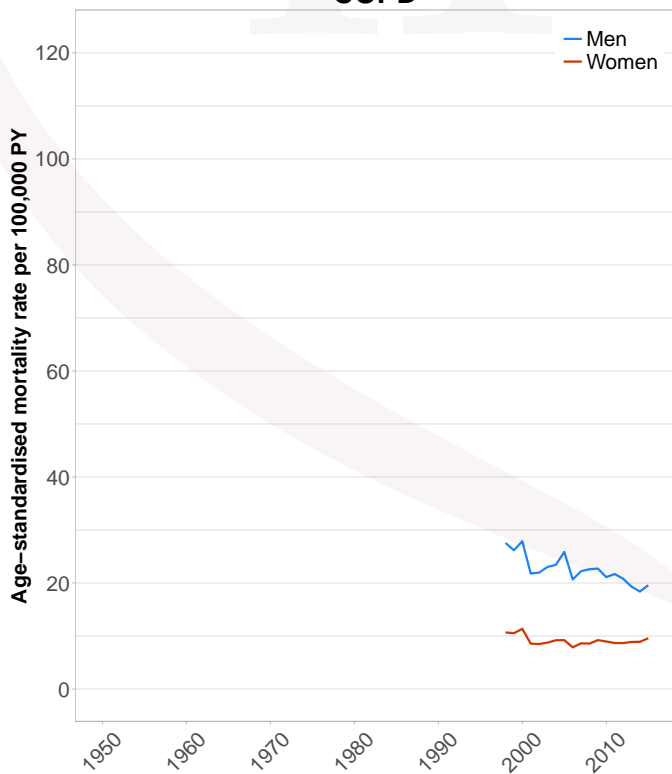

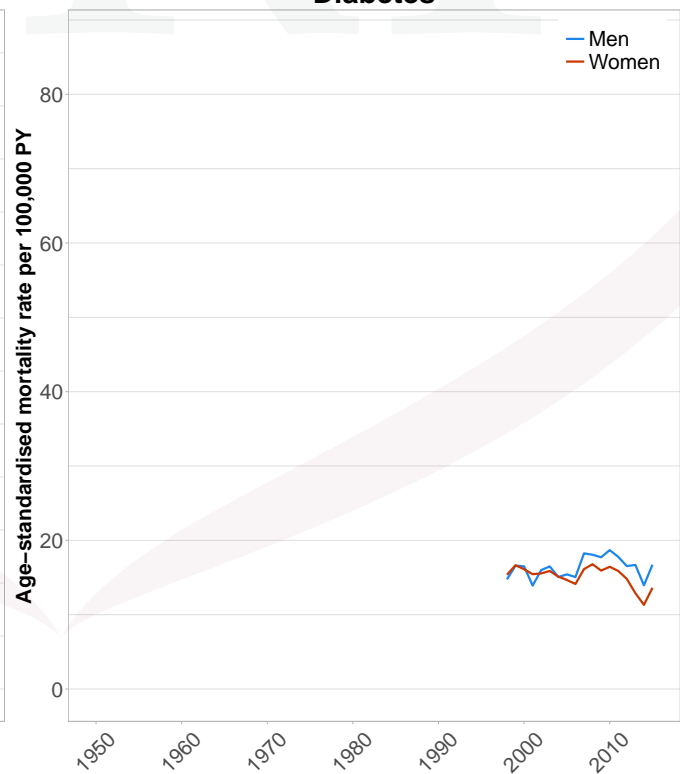
